The role of museums in a Dementia-friendly
Community

The role of the arts in fighting loneliness and cognitive decline is now widely recognized. Source of vital benefit to people, the arts and cultural participation help preserve mental health and stay active and connected to community life for longer. WHO encourages the construction of intersectoral health policies, which promote dialogue between culture, education and sociality, and the Italian National Prevention Plan 2020-2025 calls for the application of a multidisciplinary, intersectoral and coordinated approach to improve the strategies for the prevention of inequalities. that impact on health.

In Italy, where the status of arts and 'community' cultural activities is still very uncertain, what role can museums play in guaranteeing the right to participate in the social life of people with dementia and in promoting well-being and inclusion through culture? What steps should museums take to build a dialogue with the social and health sector? How can they actively involve people living with dementia, including in planning activities? What contribution can they make to the development of more dementia-friendly cities?
